4. FORCE AND MOTION

4.1 Newton's Laws of Motion

We are familiar with the following common experiences:

- (1) A ball placed on a level ground will remain on the same spot unless it is caused to move by some external agent (e.g. through kicking)
- (2) If a stationary ball is kicked, it moves. The harder it is kicked, the faster it moves away; and
- (3) If a ball is dropped on the floor (thereby exerting a downward force on the floor), the ball bounces, implying that it has experienced an upward push (force) from the floor.

These and other similar experiences are crude illustrations of the interrelationships between force and motion, and are summarized in Newton's three laws of motion, which state as follows:

First Law: A body at rest continues in its state of rest, and one in uniform motion continues in its state of uniform motion in a straight line unless a net external force acts on it.

Second Law: A body which is subjected to a net external force acquires an acceleration which is directly proportional to the force and is in the same direction as the force.

It can also be stated as: the rate of change of momentum of a body is proportional to the net external force acting upon the body.

Third Law: To every force applied by a body A on body B, there is an equal and opposite force applied by body B on body

The experiences (1), (2) and (3) listed above relate, respectively, to the first second and third laws. The first law introduces the concept of *inertia*, which is the reluctance of an object to change its state of rest or of uniform motion. The quantity of matter contained in a body, or its *mass*, is a measure of its inertia. This plays a prominent role in the mathematical statement of the law:

$$\hat{F} = ma. \tag{4.1}$$

where a is the acceleration of a body due to a net external force \vec{F} , and m, the proportionality constant, is the mass of the body. \vec{F} is measured in Newtons (N), when m is in kilograms and a in m/s^2 . Thus

$$1 N = 1 kg \times 1 m/s^2$$
, or $[N] = [kg.m/s^2]$.

If we apply Newton's second law to an object falling freely under gravity, F = W (weight of the body) and a = g in eq. (4.1) to give

$$W = mg (4.2)$$

Thus the weight of the body is simply equal to the product of its mass and the acceleration due to gravity (g).

The third law involves two separate bodies. Thus if body A exerts a force F_A on body B, then B also exerts a force $F_B = -F_A$ on A. A book placed on a table, for instance, exerts a downward force (the book's weight) on the table, while the table exerts an upward force (or force of reaction) on the book which is equal to the weight of the book.

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4.2 Impulse and Momentum

A body which increases its velocity uniformly from u to v within an interval of time t acquires an acceleration

$$a = \frac{(v - u)}{l}$$

and the force, F acting on the body is (eq. 4.1)

$$F = \frac{m(v - u)}{t}, \text{ or}$$

$$Ft = mv - mu \tag{4.3}$$

The product of the force and the time for which it acted (Ft) is the *impulse* produced by the force, while the product of the mass and velocity of the body is the body's *momentum*. Thus equation (4.3) states that the impulse on a body is equal to the change in momentum of the body. Since m is in [kg] and v in [m/s], the unit of momentum is [kg.m/s] or [N.s], which is also the unit of impulse.

Problem Solving Tips

 Identify all the forces acting on the body under consideration.

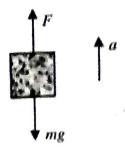
- The frictional force, if present, should be indicated in the direction opposite to that of motion.
- The net force in the direction of motion should be set equal to the mass of the body multiplied by its acceleration (Newton's second law).
- Impulse = force x time = change in momentum.
- For colliding bodies, total momentum before collision = total momentum after collision (principle of conservation of momentum).

4-1 An upward force of 1.2 x 10⁴ N acts on an elevator of mass 2.0 x 10³ kg. Calculate the elevator's acceleration.

Solution



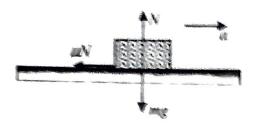
The forces acting on the elevator are its weight, mg. downwards and the upward force F. Net upward force is

$$F - mg = ma$$

where a is the acceleration of the elevator.
 $1.2 \times 10^4 - (2.0 \times 10^3 \times 9.8) = (2.0 \times 10^3)a$
or $a = -3.8 \, m/s^2$ (i.e. downwards).

4-2 A box of books of mass 2.0 kg is stiding across a level floor and its retardation is measured to be 4.0 mis². Calculate the coefficient of kinetic friction. (OAU)

Solution



Resolving vertically gives

$$N = mg$$
 (1)

The only horizontal force on the book is $-\mu_K N$ (the negative sign is added because this force is opposite to the direction of motion, which gives rise to acceleration

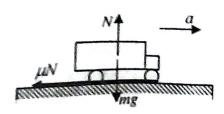
$$a = 4.0 \text{ m/s}^2$$

Thus $-\mu_K N = ma$, or $\mu_K = -ma/N$ In view of eqn. (1),

$$\mu_K = -ma/mg = -a/g$$

= 4.0/9.8 = 0.408

4-3 What is the shortest distance in which an automobile traveling on a level road at 100 km/hr can be stopped (a) when the coefficient of friction between the tyres and the road is 0,5 - (b) on a wet day when the coefficient of friction is only 0.3?



Solution

For vertical equilibrium,

$$N = mg$$

Solution

$$F_f = \mu_K N = 0.25N$$

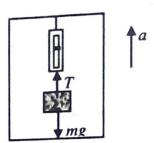

Solution

Net upward force on the body is

$$T - mg = ma$$
 or

$$T=m(a+g)$$



Taking T = 50 N, $a = 3 m/s^2$ and g = 9.8m/s² gives

$$50 = m(3.0 + 9.8)$$
, or $m = 3.91 \, kg$

The weight of the body is mg = (3.91)(9.8) = 38.28 N.

A passenger in a large ship 4-10 sailing in quiet sea hangs a ball from the ceiling of his cabin by means of a long thread. As the ship accelerates, the passenger observes that the ball lags behind the point of suspension and so the pendulum no longer hangs ship's vertically. Determine the acceleration when the pendulum makes an angle of 35° with vertical. (OAU)

Solution

The forces acting on the ball are its weight (mg) and the tension (T) in the thread. Net horizontal force on ball is

$$T\sin 35^\circ = ma \tag{1}$$

For vertical equilibrium,

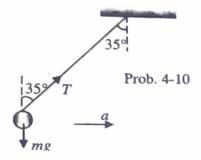
$$T\cos 35^\circ = mg \tag{2}$$

From (1) and (2),

$$a = g \tan 35^\circ = 9.8 \tan 35^\circ = 6.86 \, m/s^2$$

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4-11 What is the momentum of a 10,000 kg truck whose velocity is 20 m/s and what velocity must a 5,000 kg truck attain in order to have the same momentum? (OAU)

Solution

Momentum = mass x velocity

$$=(10,000)(20)=2\times10^5 \text{ kg.m/s}$$

A 5,000 kg truck will have the same momentum if its velocity v is such that

$$(5,000)(v) = 2 \times 10^5$$
 or $v = 40 \ m/s$.

What force is needed to impart a 4-12 velocity of 6 m/s to a 150 kg body in 5 s if the body is initially at rest?(OAU)

Solution

Ft =
$$m(v-u)$$
, where $t = 5 s$, $m = 150 kg$, $u = 0$, and $v = 6 m/s$. Thus

$$F = m(v - u)/t = 150(6 - 0)/5$$

$$= 180 N$$

A tennis ball has a mass of 0.06 4-13 kg. Impact with the racket changes its velocity from 25 m/s towards the racket to 35 m/s away from the racket. What impulse did the racket exert on (OAU) the ball?

Solution

Impulse = m(v-u), where m = 0.06 kg. u = -25 m/s (initial velocity is opposite to direction of imparted force), v = 35 m/s.

Impulse =
$$(0.06)(35 - (-25)) = 3.6 N.s$$

A 0.001 kg bullet is fired with a velocity of 800 m/s into a soft wood of mass 1 kg, resting on a smooth surface. Find the final velocity if the bullet is fully embedded in the wood after the collision. (OAU)

Solution

Let the bullet (of mass m_b) and the wood (of mass $m_{\rm w}$) both move with velocity v collision. Conservation after momentum gives

$$m_b u_b + m_w u_w = (m_b + m_w) v$$

where u_{b} , u_{w} are the initial velocities of the bullet and the wood respectively. $m_h =$ 0.001 kg, $u_b = 800 \text{ m/s}$, $m_w = 1 \text{ kg}$, $u_w = 0$. thus

$$v = (m_b u_b + m_w u_w)/(m_b + m_w)$$

= (0.001)(800)/1.001
= 0.799 m/s

A man kicks a stationary ball of mass 200 g, giving it a speed of 100 cm/s. (a) What impulse is imparted to the ball? (b) If the time of impact between the ball and the man's foot is 0.01 s, determine the force with which the ball is kicked.

Solution

- (a) m = 0.2 kg, u = 0, v = 1 m/s. Impulse = m(v - u) = 0.2(1) = 0.2 kg.m/s
- (b) $Ft = 0.2 \Rightarrow F = 0.2/t = 0.2/0.01 = 20 \text{ N}$
